This year's Cowal Open Studios weekend once again proved to be a great success with early

The 2023 COS art trail was divided into four distinct routes covering the north, south, east and west of Cowal.

"It's been a fantastic weekend and we even had some blue skies!" commented Jenny Phillips of Cowal Open Studios. "We've yet to receive all of the statistics but figures received to date suggest that both local people and visitors to Cowal have embraced the open studios initiative once again." Toward-based fibre artist Mhairi Scott declared: "There was a mix of visitors who had been before and came back to see different artists this time around and others for whom it was their first time going around the studios.

"Some had moved into the area and wanted to get to know what was going on creatively here. Others came from as far as Dailly in South Ayrshire, Irvine in North Ayrshire and quite a few from Glasgow. All loved the variety of artists in the mix and found it really interesting to see where they lived and worked.
